**National Coalition of 100 Black Women Presents
My Sister's Keeper Financial Literacy Boot Camp**

The National Coalition of 100 Black Women, Indianapolis Chapter, Inc. (NCBW) will present the 7th annual *"My Sister's Keeper" Financial Literacy boot camp* on **Saturday, April 29, 2017**. **The workshop is from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. at New Direction Church, 5330 E. 38th Street, Indianapolis 46218.** The program is free of charge but space is limited. NCBW encourages women to come out and bring a sister, cousin, friend, mother, daughter, aunt... to be educated and empowered. This Money Smart Week workshop is the first in a series to be presented this year. NCBW is partnering with **Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. – Alpha Mu Omega Chapter, AARP, and CareSource** to present this series of workshops. Breakfast will be provided.

This series is titled *Women Building Our Financial Legacy* and the April 29th workshop will focus on **"What Every Woman Needs to Know About Social Security" and "What Every Woman Needs to Know About Investments."** Social Security Administration and investment literacy experts will share key information and address questions and concerns.

NCBW launched "My Sister's Keeper" in 2011 as a national financial literacy boot camp to provide critical information about wealth creation and sustainment. *My Sister's Keeper* incorporates training on basic financial concepts, budgeting, wills, real estate investments, insurance and retirement planning through interactive workshop settings. It is designed for African-American women who want to build and leave assets for the next generation. "Financial literacy is critical to the "soft landing" that people generally want in retirement," said My Sister's Keeper founder Iris Cooper.

NCBW chapters across the nation are reaching out to African-American women in order to spread this important information through community partnerships and alliances.

According to chapter president Cynthia Oda, "The National Coalition of 100 Black Women has been an unwavering voice for African-American women for nearly 35 years. Our mission is to advocate on behalf of women and girls to promote leadership development and gender equity in the areas of health, education and economic empowerment.
